In 1914 Auden was living in Solihull. After the First World War the family moved to Harborne. This photograph was taken the year before Auden went to prep school (St Edmund's School, Hindhead, Surrey) as a boarder in autumn 1915, aged eight.



He served in various capacities in the West Indies, the Cape of Good Hope, Canada, the Netherlands, Sicily, Spain and in the Napoleonic Wars including the Battle of Waterloo for which service he was highly decorated. After his retirement from active duty, he served in a number of civilian positions, being promoted to general four years before his death.

The Third Man was written in 8 weeks as the screen treatment that the author created as a first step in the production of the film version which appeared in 1949 and won first prize at the Cannes Film Festival and also won a BAFTA for Best British Film of 1950. Robert Krasker won an Oscar in 1951 for Best Cinematography (Black & White). The Third Man was directed by Carol Reed and starred Joseph Cotten, Alida Valli, Orson Welles and Trevor Howard. The Third Man is considered Graham Greene's most iconic tale set in post-war Vienna ('a smashed dreary city') occupied by the four allied powers.



First edition, first impression (with "whip" rather than "whips" on page 50, line 13), in the uncommon dust jacket.

This famous and highly controversial lesbian novel went through only two small printings in Britain because of its contentious themes. It was the focus of vicious criticism from the editor of the Sunday Express, James Douglas, who vilified Hall's work as pornographic "moral poison". Government officials pressured Jonathan Cape into withdrawing the novel, and when Cape slyly leased the rights to a Parisian press, who smuggled copies into Britain, those too were seized by the police and the Parisian publisher was prosecuted at trial. The Well of Loneliness was subsequently banned in England... This led to the order of the chief magistrate, Sir Chartres Biron, that all copies be destroyed, and that literary merit presented no grounds for defence. Despite protests from literary figures such as Virginia Woolf, Leonard Woolf, and John Buchan, Biron's judgement was

upheld by a Court of Appeal (ODNB).

It was not republished until 1949 and has since become "a lesbian 'classic' which has never been out of print and which has been translated into over a dozen languages" (Aldrich & Wotherspoon, p. 199).





First edition of this politico-economic discourse about the negative financial, economic, and moral aspects of imperialism as a nationalistic business enterprise.

Considered Hobson's magnum opus, *Imperialism* was named "one of the most influential books of the 20th century" (*Routledge Encyclopedia of International Political Economy*). In the book he espouses the opinion that imperial expansion is driven by a search for new markets and investment opportunities overseas. *Imperialism*

gained Hobson an international reputation, and influenced such notable thinkers as Vladimir Lenin and Leon Trotsky, and Hannah Arendt's *The Origins of Totalitarianism* (1951).

Lenin heavily drew on the work for his own *Imperialism*, the Highest Stage of Capitalism (1916), and it proved a major influence on Marxist critiques of imperialism over the century.





It was re-issued by Olympia later that year under the title 'Lollipop' almost entirely from the original sheets of 'Candy'. The title was changed; the first two pages of text were reset; the dedication was changed; and the quotation on the first page was changed from Baudelaire to Rimbaud. Finally, the copyright date was altered from 1958 in 'Candy' to 1959 in 'Lollipop'. Most copies have a new price (NF15) stamped over the printed one; this is the first state. (There was a further re-issue of 'Lollipop' by Olympia in 1962.)

My new book would be a dream if I could have 2 months to work on it, but I never shall I can see. Besides the mongiles wouldn't care for it so what's the point? Nancy's translation of André Roussin's comedy, *La Petite Hutte*, was published in 1951. Her mention of 'the Guatemalans' was a reference to Guatemala's recent threat to invade and annex British Honduras. The 'mongiles' referring to the communist rising in French Madagascar. The new book she is trying to finish is *Love in a Cold Climate*, published in 1949.

Nancy was clearly most enchanted with her new hat. She refers to it again in a letter of 10 March to Diana Mosley (Letters p. 205)

The Satanic Verses was Rushdie's fourth novel, and caused huge controversy when it was initially released due to its depiction of the prophet Muhammad. The title refers to the satanic verses, a group of Quranic verses that refer to three Pagan Meccan goddesses: Allāt, Uzza, and Manāt. The novel employs elements of magic realism interspersed with a sequence of subplots that take the form of intricate dream narratives relayed by the protagonist. American theorist Timothy Brennan would later praise The Satanic Verses as, "the most ambitious novel yet published to deal with the immigrant experience in Britain".

The scandal that ensued surrounding creative censorship was extremely divisive. A year after publication Ruhollah Khomeini, Supreme Leader of Iran, issued a fatwa ordering Muslims to kill Rushdie for blaspheming against Islam. A fatwa cannot be revoked in the Shia Islamic tradition. Pakistan banned the book in 1988 and the importing of the book was forbidden in India. Many translators of The Satanic Verses have suffered serious injury and, in the case of Rushdie's Japanese translator, death. In fact, in 2022, Rushie was himself attacked on stage whilst talking at an event. Subsequent to this stabbing, he lost sight in one eye and the ability to use one hand. Remarking on the extreme controversy surrounding The Satantic Verses, scholar M.D. Fletcher considered the irony, "that some of the major expressions of hostility toward Rushdie came from those about whom and (in some sense) for whom he wrote."

Speaking of his own work, Rushdie has defined his intentions as being, not about Islam at all, but rather a novel concerned with issues as varied as; "migration, metamorphosis, divided selves, love, death, London and Bombay". The complex controversy surrounding The Satanic Verses

continues to impact. It is an influential novel which explores, amongst many other subjects, the disillusionment suffered by characters in between identification with competing cultures. It is a novel which, through unusual surreal depiction, highlights identity crises whilst binding its text in powerful parallel stories with roots in diverse religious history.





Lord Peter Bredon Wimsey DSO (later 17th Duke of Denver) is the fictional protagonist in a series of detective novels and short stories by one of the founding mothers of mystery, Dorothy L. Sayers . A dilettante who solves mysteries for his own amusement, Wimsey is an archetype for the British gentleman detective. He is often assisted by his valet and former batman, Mervyn Bunter; by his good friend and later brother-in-law, police detective Charles Parker; and, in a few books, by Harriet Vane, who becomes his wife. The character and the stories he stars in are often considered among the best of the pre-World War II "Golden Age" mysteries.

The Wimsey stories take place between 1922 and 1936, and (somewhat unusually for a mystery series) the characters age in real time: Lord Peter is thirty-two in *Whose Body?* and forty-six in *Busman's Honeymoon*.

While there is a film called *The Silent Passenger* made in Sayers's lifetime based on the character, she disliked it, a feeling seemingly reciprocated by the public and fandom, as it has not survived. In 1940 Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer released a "satisfactory" film version of *Busman's Honeymoon* (called *Haunted Honeymoon* in the USA) starring Robert Montgomery and Constance Cummings. In the 1970s, the BBC produced five miniseries starring Ian Carmichael as Lord Peter (*Clouds of Witness, The Unpleasantness at the Bellona Club, Five Red Herrings, Murder Must Advertise, and The Nine Tailors*). Carmichael also starred in the BBC's radio drama series from the '70s to the '80s which adapted nearly all the novels, save for *Gaudy Night*, which was finally adapted in 2005. The '80s saw Edward Petherbridge and Harriet Walter adapt the three main Harriet Vane novels, *Strong Poison, Have His Carcase, and Gaudy Night*. Carmichael brought both humour and depth to the role, while Petherbridge emphasized the melancholy and romantic sides of the sleuth.







Somerville and Ross are best known for their $Irish\ R.M.$ stories; this early novel, written at the request of a local clergyman, is in a more serious vein.





In Elizabeth Hudson's bibliography of the authors, she notes: 'A unique copy of *Naboth's Vineyard* was in the possession of Messrs. Spurr & Swift of London in 1932 and was described by them as having the name of Richard E. King Ltd. as being the publisher, but no date. This book was bound in brown cloth with gilt edges. As this edition was totally unknown to the authors, it seems fair to assume that it is a pirate edition.'

The literary scholar Nevill Coghill was Edith Somerville's nephew. In his copy of the bibliography we find the following note: 'Another copy of the pirated edition is in the possession of my sister Katharine, who says it is bound in green. This is Katharine's copy, and bears her bookplate to the front pastedown.'

Richard Edward King was a notorious figure, seen variously as a hero for developing publishing into a mass market producing 'Books for the Millions' - or a villain for printing books for which he did not hold the copyright and for being an insurance fraudster arsonist. The business at the Curtain Road premises was a short-lived affair at the end of Victoria's reign.





Without her help and inspiration, it would not have been begun, and could not have been completed. I feel, therefore, that to join her name with mine on the title-page is my duty, as well as my pleasure.'

For the rest of her life Somerville, believer in the afterlife and regular attender of seances, continued to publish her solo novels under the authorial description of 'Somerville and Ross'.

In many cases, these notes result in interesting textual differences between the UK edition, published in October 1973, and the US edition published the following year. For example, Schwed's first note reads: 'Page 10, near bottom of page: I don't think the gag about Ethiopian slaves is that funny and with the climate today being what it is regarding slurring reference to a black, I wish you'd think of something better.' Despite the phraseology, jarring to the modern ear, Schwed was right. Wodehouse agreed, and in his typed response instructed Schwed to cut the following exchange for the US edition which had appeared in its UK counterpart:

'But couldn't you have told her to go and drown herself in the Serpentine?'

'How could I? She's the boss. You wouldn't expect an Ethiopian slave to tell Cleopatra to go and drown in the Nile.'

'I wouldn't have taken you for an Ethiopian slave.'

'Only because I'm a bit blonder than the average Ethiopian."


Other points picked up by Schwed include a reminder that cabs in London are black, not yellow (Wodehouse had been in the United States so long he appears to have forgotten), and that 'bird' is more likely London slang for a young woman than 'popsy' or 'doll'. On one of Schwed's notes Wodehouse is less flexible. Questioning a spelling, Schwed writes 'I don't know why Shakespeare spelled "the ravelled sleave of care" as "sleave" but I'm pretty sure he did.' Wodehouse, whose knowledge of the Bard was deep and wide, is entertainingly dismissive: 'Shakespeare couldn't even spell his own name, so I don't think we need worry about 'sleaves' and 'sleeves'.'

A fascinating exchange between an author and editor.

Regarded as the world's first bodybuilding magazine, *Sandow's Magazine of Physical Culture* was founded in 1898 and ran until June 1907. Among its contributors were some who found greater fame elsewhere: the music hall comedian Dan Leno, H.H. Munro ('Saki') and P.G. Wodehouse.

There is no author of *Some Football Facts* credited in the volume, and there is no attribution either in McIlvaine or its Addendum. However, Wodehouse records in his cash journal, *Money Received for Literary Work*, that he co-wrote the piece with one F. Overy.

As Wodehouse's biographer Frances Donaldson observed, it was vitally important to the boy Plum that he was 'above average at games'. Luckily, he was known at school as 'a noted athlete, a fine footballer and cricketer [and] a boxer', and indeed sport inspired much of his earliest writings.

Wodehouse's contributions apart, these two volumes provide a plethora of information about sport in Britain in the early Edwardian period. Included in these issues are the 6 instalments of the intriguingly named *Types of Women Athletes* written by E.K. and L.M. Reader focusing on swimming "Water Nymphs at the Royal Aquarium" featuring Alice Sinclair, Annie Luker and Minnie Johnson; fencing featuring the actress Esme Beringer; more swimming featuring Agnes Beckwith; weight-lifting featuring Miss Vulcana; gymnastics featuring Miss Gertrella, the phantom dancer-gymnast; and acrobatics featuring the Sisters Macarte and the Lizette Troup.



"It is sometimes forgotten that Chesterton's early training, like that of his fellow Catholic, Evelyn Waugh, was as an artist. He went first to the art school, in St John's Wood, of Philip Hermogenes Calderon, who was a member of 'The St John's Wood Clique' with W.F. Yeames, painter of 'And when did you last see your father'.

Chesterton progressed to the Slade, narrowly missing an overlap with Augustus John. On 31 December 1899 – even nearer the *fin* of *the fin de siecle* than the *Enigma Variations* -Chesterton made a sketch which he entitled *'The Last Sunday of the 19th Century'*. He drew it on the back of a sample of water-colour paper. The drawing shows, in pelting rain, a middle-class (perhaps upper middle-class) family – bowler-hatted *paterfamilias*, two pigtailed daughters in boaters and possibly a son.

The drawing deposits us at almost the very end of the guttering century. The slightly stolid, quintessentially English figures have absolutely nothing to do with the stereotype of the *fin de siècle*. Chesterton depicts them from behind. They are walking away from the nineteenth century and into the twentieth."

Hillier had become a friend of Nancy Dixon, whose mother, Frederica [Freda] Spencer (later Bayley) had been secretary to Chesterton. The drawing was given to Hillier by Nancy's son.

The front of the sample sheet has other pencil sketches by Chesterton including two men with dogs and a seated lady.
